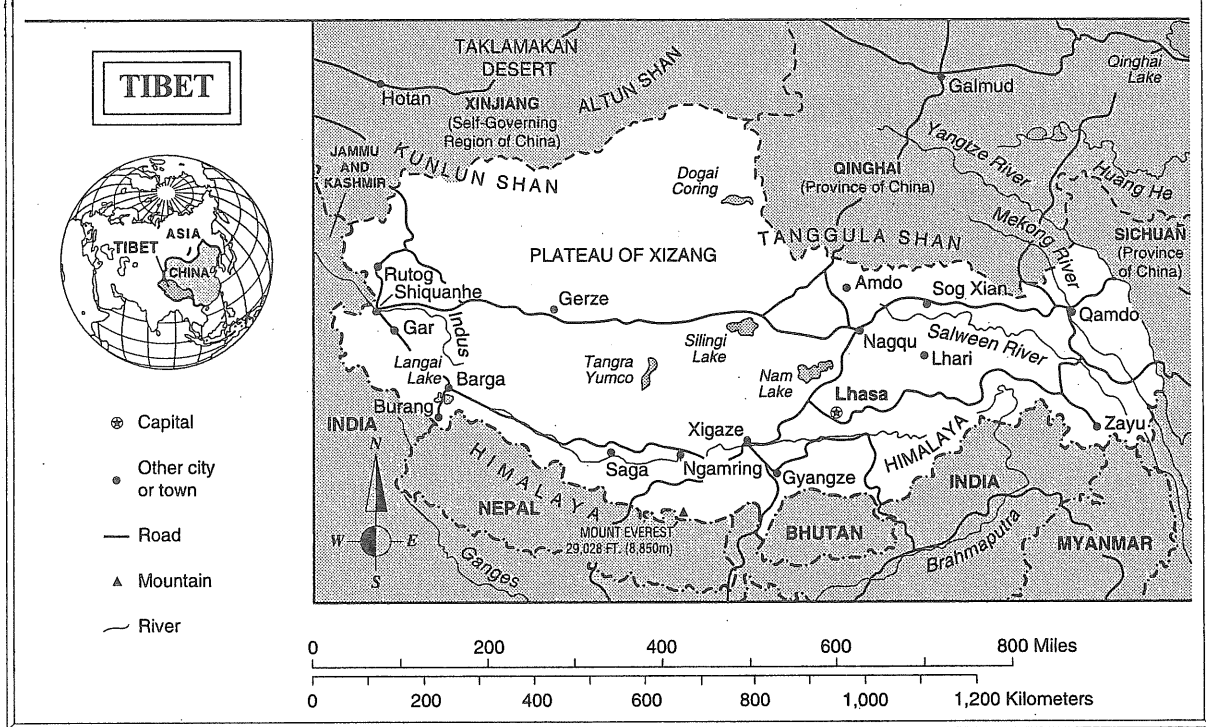

Tibet, or Xizang as the Chinese call it, is a remote land in south-central Asia. Tibet's dominant physical features are snow-capped mountains and wind-swept plateaus. Its average elevation is 16,000 feet (4,880 m). For this reason, Tibet is often called the "Roof of the World." For centuries, Tibet's high mountain ranges isolated it from other regions. Parts of the country still await exploration.

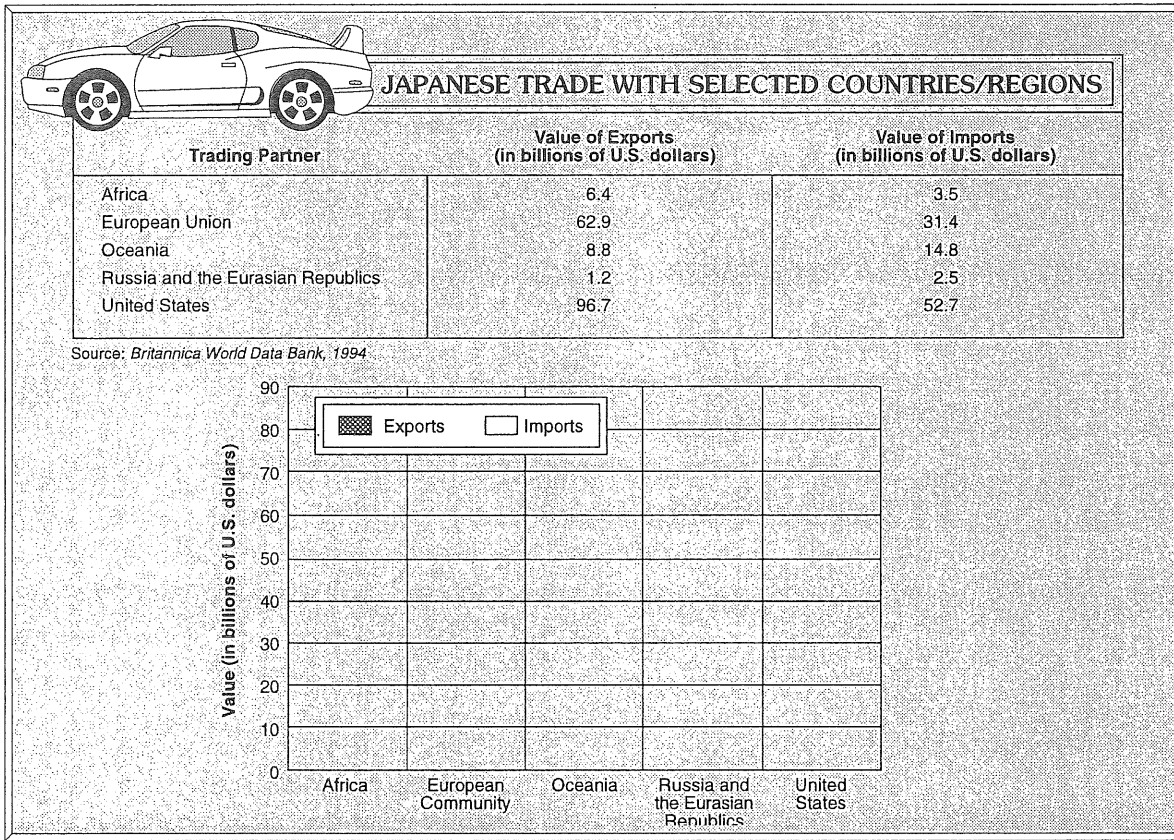
